One of the highlights of the Remembrance Day commemoration events November 11 will be the unveiling by the Hon. E. C. Plow, Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, and dedication of the War Memorial within the Halifax Memorial Library. The unveiling will follow the annual ceremony at the Cenotaph.

Colonel R. J. Graham, DSO, CD is the parade commander, Major S. S. Carroll, CD, parade marshal; Capt. P. A. Neatby, parade adjutant; and WO 1 H. L. Black, CD, parade sergeant major.

The Remembrance Day Parade will move off at 9.55 a. m. from the North Commons, led by the RCN Band, with mounted detachments from the Halifax City Police preceding and following the parade. The parade will move west on Cogswell Street, south on Robie Street to Jubilee Road, east on Jubilee Road to Summer Street, south on Summer Street to Spring Garden

Road, east on Spring Garden Road to Barrington Street, north on Barrington Street to the Grand Parade.

The Red Chevron Club and disabled veterans unable to march will fall in on the west end of the esplanade prior to the arrival of the parade.

His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor will arrive at 10.55 a. m. at which time the Parade Commander will call the Parade to attention and the RCA Band will play a Royal Salute. There will be a two minutes silence at 11 a. m.

Wreaths will be laid at the Cenotaph as follows: His Honor the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia; representative of the Government of Canada; president of the Halifax County Chapter of the Silver Cross Association; representative of Provincial Command, Royal Canadian Legion; president of the Halifax District Council Royal Canadian Legion; United Kingdom Trade Commissioner; Consul General of the United States of America; Consul of the Republic of France; Consul of Venezuela; The Premier of the Province of Nova Scotia; His Worship the Mayor of Halifax; Flag Officer Atlantic Coast—Royal Canadian Navy; General Officer Commanding—Eastern Command; Air Officer Commanding—Maritime Air Command; 4 Militia Group; Officer Commanding, H. Division, RCMP; Chief of Police of Halifax; Legion branches and other veterans' organizations.

After the ceremony the Royal Canadian Legion and veterans' organizations will march from the Grand Parade led by the RCASC Band, east on George Street to the Boer War Memorial on Province House grounds, and then to the Sebastopol Monument on Barrington Street. Wreaths are laid at each of these monuments.

The RCMP, RCAF, CA (R) and RCN contingents will retire from the Grand Parade and will turn right on Granville Street, RCN will turn left at Granville Street, where all contingents will be dismissed at the discretion of the commanders. Canadian Army (Militia) units will proceed from the Cenotaph, east on George Street to the Ferry plaza.

Should inclement weather prevail on November 11 the parade will be cancelled but the remainder of the ceremony will carry on as scheduled. An announcement will be made over local radio stations at 7.30 a. m. and repeated at 8 a. m., November 11 if the parade is cancelled.
